University Avenue Corridor Plan

The University Avenue Corridor Plan has been an ongoing project for the RNA in one form or another for almost six years. The RNA board has been working for several months on a draft of the plan that will be presented to the neighborhood at an Open House at the InnTowner on Wednesday, November 14. Neighbors will have a chance to ask questions and comment on the plan. Several weeks prior to the open house, the entire plan and an executive summary will be posted on the RNA website, so people can become familiar with its contents before they come to the open house. We urge everyone to come to the open house, so that we can get a true sample of the neighborhood's vision for the corridor.

A Note from LD—

I hope you will read the draft of the Corridor Plan and add your thoughts to this neighborhood conversation which has included meetings of the RNA subcommittee, the RNA Board, open house presentations, meetings with the city planning staff, and email conversations on the RNA listserv.

The process has been long, complicated and, I believe, successful. Even with differences in

perspectives, the draft offers a shared vision recognizing our neighborhood will change and that we want those changes to be positive. Thanks to the many neighbors who have contributed their thoughts and ideas. I encourage you to join the conversation at our open house on November 14.

It's Fall again, and the neighborhood is abuzz with Badger football, kids back in school, yard sales, leaf raking, and everything else that makes this a special season of the year.





Olive Jones Park Nears Completion

The playground at Randal School—Olive Jones Park went through the final phase of reconstruction this summer. This included replacement of the retaining walls, smooth new asphalt, and a beautiful black metal fence all around the perimeter. There are also two new gates on Chadbourne, one for cars on game days and one for bicycles, strollers and wheelchairs every day.

Next spring will bring trees and other landscaping for the two eastern corners. The Regent Neighborhood Association is also working with a city grant to create an artistic "gathering space" in the northeast corner, with two benches and planters—watch for installation of the benches in the spring.

Thanks to everyone who helped with this project—parents, neighbors, local businesses, and volunteers. The Madison Parks Division provided three years of dedicated project management, and the city made significant financial contributions each year. We are especially grateful for the support of the Franklin-Randall PTO and the Regent Neighborhood Association, whose generous donations started and finished this project.

We cannot say enough good things about our honorary co-chairs, Alder Shiva Bidar-Sielaff and Principal John Wallace, and Alison Alter, the original chair of this project. On behalf of them and ourselves, we hope you and your children enjoy the playground for many years to come! ■

Thank you to all who have supported the Regent Neighborhood Association this year by becoming members or renewing your membership.





Streets and Transportation Committee Report

Two and a half years ago I was scouting out Madison neighborhoods to relocate my family. Driving east-bound on Regent, I stopped at the Speedway/Highland intersection. Cars passed, some two at a time. Chaos reigned. I didn't know what to do. Living in Boston at the time, I was accustomed to questionable traffic design and impatient drivers, but this intersection was too much, something had to be done.

Thanks to the good work of the previous transportation committee, Alder Bidar-Sielaff, and city traffic engineers, the intersection received several enhancements last summer (see sidebar). While the changes have been positive, more can be done and will be a priority for the transportation committee.

Other priorities for the coming year include:

- The near west traffic study, which will review how our neighborhood is impacted by commuting traffic, may offer insight to reduce commuting traffic on the local streets. Results are expected by the end of 2012.
- Finalizing traffic/transportation recommendations for the University Ave Corridor Plan.
- Exploring the possible addition of stop signs at key intersections, particularly around West and Randall schools.

Regent/Highland/Speedway Update

While many people may look at the intersection and ask what is different, there are important improvements to note. Jack O'Keefe, who works as the crossing guard at the intersection identified the following:

- The advance of the stop line on Regent (heading west) and Speedway have resulted in three improvements:
 - 1. Left turns from Speedway down Highland are easier. More people are signaling to turn than in the past, giving a better indication for cars on Regent to yield to the left turn.
 - 2. There are fewer rolling stops on Regent now that the stop line is further into the intersection.
 - 3. Pedestrians crossing Regent are now more visible to cars turning right from Speedway
- Making the left turn off Regent (heading east) onto Highland flows better as a result of the bright yellow island and the yellow line marks directing drivers around the island.
- The installation of the overhead stop sign on Speedway should help reduce speeds for cars approaching the intersection.
- The addition of the islands on Highland makes it easier for pedestrians to cross the street when unattended.

While the intersection is not perfect, and may never be, a few minor enhancements may result in more noticeable changes.

Alder Report, District 5—Shiva Bidar-Sielaff

Dear Neighbors,

My most exciting news of the past few months is having had the honor of meeting the President of the United States during his visit to Madison on October 3. Who would have ever imagined that a little girl that lived through the Iranian Revolution would meet the President of the USA! It was simply an amazing experience. I felt humbled to represent the City of Madison Common

Council as its President and the Regent Neighborhood as your Alder.

And now some key neighborhood issues that I have been working on over the past few months:

Traffic/Parking/Bike/Pedestrian Issues

- Island on Farley at Chamberlain: based on the survey showing a majority support by a survey of immediate neighbors, the island was built in September.
- Proposed SW West Bike Path lighting: I sent an email to the neighborhood listservs on September 24 to explain my position on this proposal. In balancing all the feedback I have received and given the other city bike/pedestrian improvement priorities, I am not supporting moving forward with the current proposal.
- A near west side traffic study funded by the City, UW, and Shorewood Hills should be under way this Fall. Traffic patterns from Midvale to Breese Terrace and Regent to the UW West Campus area will be studied to assist with better traffic management for the entire area. My goal is to make sure that we look at ways to reduce the commuter traffic impact on our neighborhood.

Development projects and proposals

• At a neighborhood meeting in early summer, Patrick and Sue Grady presented a proposal to build an eight-unit apartment building with underground parking at 2224 Regent Street. The great majority of neighborhood residents expressed opposition to such a large building on the site of the current single family house. The Gradys are working on a four-unit proposal which I will share with you as soon as I have details and drawings.

• 2635 University Avenue (former Scooter U site):
This site has seen lots of interest. Taco Bell and
Dunkin Donuts expressed interest but, given the
challenges of a drive-through on this site, and after
conversations with me and City staff, they decided
not to pursue this location. The latest proposal is
for a doctor's office. It seems like a very good use of
the site. A formal proposal has not yet been
submitted to the City. As soon as it is, I will make
sure to share it on the neighborhood listservs.

2013 City Budget



Dane County Board Report, District 10—Jeremy Levin

The fall is when the County starts its annual budgeting process, and this year looks to be as tough as the last few. The State's imposed levy limit, which allows a levy increase equal to the greater of zero percent or the increase in equalized value due to net new construction, will likely mean cuts across many departments. The Dane County Department of Human Services presented its budget

to the Health and Human Needs (HHN) committee on August 29th and, fortunately, with the help of outside revenue, was able to propose an increase of more than \$6.2 million for critical programs and services. The increase will enhance the access to, and the quality of, our human services safety net. It includes a funding increase of \$3 million for persons with developmental disabilities and a \$400,000 increase in mental health services. The HHN committee will spend much of September and October working through the budget and passing it on to the full Board to vote on in November.

In other news, a joint Dane County, UW, and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) study will investigate carp removal options from Lake Kegonsa and other Dane County Lakes. This is another initiative resulting from the county board's Clear Lakes Initiative, which began in February 2012 and will utilize funding from a State DNR grant that will allow the county to invest more than \$200,000 in resources to help boaters curb the growth and transfer of aquatic invasive species at boat launches on Lakes Waubesa and Kegonsa. It is my hope that in the near future the County will be able to expand its pilot project stations to boat landings at Lakes Mendota and Monona.

Finally, the Board is also creating a county-wide education task force to explore, review and develop strategies for the county and its various school districts to collaborate on ways to streamline services that would benefit Dane County families and taxpayers. It is expected that this facilitated collaboration will lead to better communication and utilization of county programs that can benefit at-risk and disadvantaged student populations.

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Author, Author!

An occasional series about writers in the 'hood

Not to be too ghoulish this Halloween season but as I prepare to cut faces in pumpkins and stock up on chocolate for trick-or-treaters, I'm thinking it's a good

time to turn neighborhood thoughts to writers among the living dead. The Regent Neighborhood can claim at least two deceased authors, conservationist Aldo Leopold (1887-1948) and historian Frederick Jackson Turner (1861-1932).

Leopold's two-story stucco house at 2222 Van Hise Avenue, across the street from West High School, is well known to many Regent Neighborhood denizens thanks to an identifying plaque in the front yard. (The home is an official City landmark.) Leopold and his family had moved there in 1924 from Albuquerque, where he had been with the U.S. Forest Service. The Madison house was within easy

walking distance of Leopold's job at the Forest Products Laboratory and, later, his offices at UW–Madison where he had been appointed chair of a new program in game management—"a first for the University of Wisconsin and the nation," according to the Leopold Foundation's Website.

but as It surprises me that while people may be familiar with Leopold as the father of wildlife management and the a good U.S. wilderness system, they haven't read his well-known collection of essays, A Sand County Almanac, published in 1949,

known collection of essays, *A Sand County Almanac*, published in 1949, shortly after his death. The *Almanac* is one of the most eloquent explorations of our relationship to the natural world and about the value of conservation.

Frederick Jackson Turner also lived in the neighborhood, some say at 2214 Van Hise. He was both a UW–Madison student and professor of history, after receiving his Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins. I read Turner's famous 1893 essay, *The Significance of the Frontier in American History*, when I was in college. Perhaps dated or politically incorrect now, the work still raises questions about how the western frontier was as much an idea

as a place, shaping the American character and our definitions of democracy and nationhood.

Turner, by the way, lists another neighborhood address—Forest Hill Cemetery. ■

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
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
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News From Regent Market Co-op
