Highland Avenue Underpass Art Shifts Into Gear

The Regent Neighborhood's efforts to build a mural at the Highland Avenue Underpass took a major step forward with a \$150,000 grant from the City of Madison. Thanks to Karin Wolf, Madison Arts Program Administrator, for her work moving the project through the design phase and to Alder Shiva Bidar-Sielaff for moving the funding proposal through the city's capital budget. This grant, in addition to neighborhood contributions, brings the project within \$15,000 of goal. The RNA is now working to complete funding and invites your participation.

The mural project was inspired by community input from the RNA's University Avenue Corridor Plan and was advanced by a class project of UW–Madison Professor Sam Dennis. His Landscape Architecture class created more than a dozen design concepts. The Regent Neighborhood Association hosted community discussions reviewing the options and, from those conversations, the neighborhood prioritized Julia Schilling's SHIFT design.

Julia describes her design as an artistic expression inspired by the legacy of scientific discovery at UW–Madison and as "an experiential gateway between Regent Neighborhood and UW–Madison. The accordion-style lenticular walls emphasize the energy and movement of Highland Avenue through interaction with two shifting images. The eight-foot-tall walls address aspects of aesthetics and safety. LED lights provide a dramatic, welcoming nighttime experience that illuminate patterns created with circle packing

algorithms. The choice of generative imagery walks the line between science and natural experience, choice and chance."

The RNA will be reaching out to potential sponsors to complete funding for this project. Watch for opportunities to support this project with neighborhood efforts in the coming months.

The Regent Neighborhood Association will welcome a new board slate at our May membership meeting. The committee also provides guidance on the use, maintenance, improvement, and creation of parks, playgrounds, greenspaces, and historic open spaces in the neighborhood. We work cooperatively with government agencies and others for the betterment of the neighborhood and the city.

MUCH More Solar at West High!

In spring 2017, West Green Club, an organization of 50 students at Madison West High School, launched Project Solis, a campaign to install solar panels at Madison West High School. Since then, West Green Club has managed to raise \$104,000 towards this initiative, successfully surpassing its initial fundraising goal of \$75,000. This renewable energy project is truly unique as one of the largest youthled efforts in Wisconsin that addresses the need for increasing student awareness of environmental issues. Because students are leading this initiative instead of parents or district administrators, the impact of this project is magnified and will result in a sustainable, long-term increase in awareness among youth of the need to tackle energy challenges facing their communities. This project has been recognized by Wisconsin State Journal, Sierra Club, WORT Radio, The Capital Times, Mayor Paul Soglin's blog, and the City of Madison.

In the final two months of this campaign, West Green Club has embarked on an aggressive fundraising goal: to raise at least \$25,000 more before March 31, 2019. If we meet this goal, we would be able to fund a solar array of nearly 100 kW, a project that would be the sixth largest solar-on-schools project in Wisconsin!

Over the past couple of years, West Green Club has developed a close relationship with Regent Neighborhood Association. West Green Club has helped run the box maze event at the annual July 4th festival, presented to the Regent Neighborhood Association board on the solar project, and received your electronics for recycling through our electronic waste recycling drives. Furthermore, the Regent Neighborhood Association generously provided West Green Club with a \$5,000 grant to install 10

solar panels at Madison West High School, solar panels that will be named on behalf of the Regent Neighborhood Association. Thank you to the Regent Neighborhood Association and all its members for your support thus far!

Club Pilates Monroe Street is operated by a local Madison couple, Erika and Nathan Baldwin. Erika and Nathan encountered Pilates nearly ten years ago at a small studio in Chicago where they went to school. Since then, they have devoted their working lives to bringing Pilates to the people. Erika and Nathan plan to open seven total Club Pilates studios. They have two additional locations in Madison: Club Pilates Madison West and Club Pilates Sun Prairie.

At a glance, you can see that fitness classes at Club Pilates Monroe Street are different from any other workout. The routines at Club Pilates emphasize smooth, flowing movement and proper pelvic and spinal alignment.

Pilates exercises first aim to develop a strong "core", or center of the body. All human movement begins in the core, but we don't keep our cores strong enough! The core consists of the abdominal muscles and the muscles surrounding and protecting the spine. Control of these muscles is achieved by integrating—or improving awareness and control—of the trunk, pelvis, and shoulder girdle. Pilates next elongates, improving muscle elasticity and joint mobility. A body with balanced strength and flexibility is pain free and less likely to become injured.

Their reformer-based group Pilates classes, combined with TriggerPoint, TRX, Springboard, EXO-chair and other equipment, are designed to build strength, mobility, and stability. They offer over 50 hours of classes per week, spread out over seven different class types and four levels of difficulty. Modifications to exercises allow for a range of difficulty, from

Greetings from Randall!

Having been raised in Louisiana, I've always appreciated how Wisconsin's crystal snow offers a wintry white backdrop to the red hearts of February. The Cajun couers I beheld as a child were nonetheless beautiful, set against swampland greens. As Valentine's Day rolls around each year, I always feel the connection between "couer" and "courage." We, young and old, breathe deeply and muster up the nerve to find that perfect way to express our love to our heart's desire.

Of course, times have changed since I was a lad. Matters of gender identity and sexual orientation have risen to a point of prominence. The scribes at Hallmark must be working overtime to pen the words that capture sentiments representative of folks who have been historically marginalized and violated. We engage in courageous conversations about our perspectives on LGBTQ+ citizens and the everevolving conventions about what constitutes a family.

At both Randall and Franklin, we have immersed ourselves in the Welcoming Schools model. Welcoming Schools is a national program being used in MMSD to create a more respectful and supportive learning environment for all students, staff and families. Professional development, lesson plans, books and inclusive language are provided around family diversity, gender and LGBTQ+ inclusion and preventing bias-based bullying. As a result, we are more cognizant of and sensitive to the assumptions we make, the examples we give, and the pronouns we use. Welcoming Schools does not promote a particular lifestyle or persuasion. It promotes justice and consideration. It promotes courage. It promotes love.

During one of my upper elementary school years, I participated in our homeroom's Valentine's Day card box decorating contest. My construction was a cardboard turntable with a Beatles' 45 rpm atop, featuring the song title, "She Loves You." I actually took first prize! My favorite entry, however, was an elevated mailbox featuring the words "Par Avion" perfectly painted on both sides. This was back at a time when airmail was distinguished from ground mail. The creator of the entry was Henry, a confident and brilliant student. He was a gifted artist as well. As my years as Henry's classmate flowed into high school, he became the target of harassment for being effeminate. While he maintained his prominence as a scholar and leader, he was jeered and bullied by certain students for being gay, though harsh terms and some force were used.

Henry came out when he was a young adult. I think about him every Valentine's Day, imagining his horrific childhood struggle with the unjust social demands placed upon him to be something he wasn't. I also own my guilt for my lack of courage to act as an ally for him.

Fear, anger and hatred seem to be the dominant themes of the messages we receive daily over the airwaves and on the ground. Even Cupid seems armed for battle. He with his arrow, however, conquers all.

As the students enter our building each Valentine's Day, I play a song over the PA. I employ my executive privilege in its selection. I typically blast a Beatles song, but not the tune I chose over a half century ago. I play, "All You Need Is Love."







Dane County Board Report — District 10

I hope this edition of the RNA Newsletter finds you and your family well, enjoying 2019. The Dane County Board will address many varied issues in 2019, but I want to focus on three key initiatives: water quality improvement, Alliant Energy Center campus redevelopment, and inclusive community engagement.



On water issues, the Board will implement recommendations of the

Healthy Farms, Healthy Lakes Task Force to reduce farm runoff that impairs the Yahara Lakes watershed. The importance and urgency of addressing runoff was underscored by the record rainfall and flooding this past summer. This effort marks the first time farmers. environmentalists, scientists, and policy makers have come together to work toward reducing phosphorus pollution while encouraging better agricultural conservation practices. The recommendations include implementation of state agricultural performance standards such as tillage setbacks and nutrient management plans, at the local level. The 2019 budget includes staffing and resources to implement the recommendations. Regarding the Alliant Energy Center, we have completed work on a draft Master Plan, which was presented to the Board at the end of 2018, and will continue to move the project forward. Guided by the "three E's" — economy, environment and equity — the plan for redevelopment of the 164-acre county-owned Alliant Energy Center campus includes expansion of the Exhibition Hall, additional hotel facilities, enhancements at Willow Island and interior streets featuring restaurants or other amenities, as well as a focus on storm water management for the entire site. The project is part of a broad effort to

Funding was included in the 2019 budget for predesign of the Exhibition Hall and storm water management work. Information on the project is at aecstudy.countyofdane.com.

Finally, the Board is redoubling its commitment to inclusive community engagement as a cornerstone of our work. In 2018, we launched the "Engage Dane" initiative to formalize the Board's engagement efforts, particularly to reach communities who may not currently participate in the county government debate, thereby improving representation and transparency. More information is available at board. countyofdane.com/Engage-Dane. A report of these efforts will be released early in 2019.

These are just three examples of the County Board's work. Of course, there are many more including efforts in the areas of criminal justice system improvement and affordable housing, which the County has provided over \$8.6 million in assistance to private sector real estate developers to support 1,020 proposed units of affordable housing spread throughout Dane County since 2015, keeping monthly rents low for working families, the disabled, veterans, single parents and others struggling to make ends meet.



- The City Council approved the 2019 budget in November. Our 2019 budget emphasized continued investment in city infrastructure and basic services as well as investments in equity and opportunity. You can find the budget at cityofmadison.com/budget/


- I was able to successfully include \$150,000 in the City's 2019 capital budget for "The Shift," the underpass art project at Highland and University Avenues. The RNA Board is leading the efforts for the additional private fundraising needed to make this project a reality. - The City is continuing its historic preservation planning process. We have now had three public input meetings in each historic district, including University Heights. The Landmarks Ordinance Review Committee (LORC) on which I sit is starting to meet every two weeks to discuss and recommend proposed changes to the ordinance. Please be sure to email me with your feedback or attend any of the LORC meeting. - University Avenue from Farley/University Bay Drive to Shorewood Blvd. is slated for reconstruction in 2020–21. Please stay tuned for the public input sessions!






