

Di Rienzo Monuments—Then and Now

Between 1880 and 1920, millions of immigrants came to the United States from many different lands, but they all had the same dream: they wanted to escape the poverty they were experiencing in their homeland and build a better life. It was this that drew Michael and Maria Rosa Di Rienzo from the Molise region of Southern Italy to this country in 1889. After landing in New York, they made their way to Madison, where they settled and eventually had 10 children, although several died as infants.

After a few years, the family sought new economic opportunities and moved to Cleveland, Ohio. It was there that the oldest son, Angelo Di Rienzo, became the first among his brothers to learn the skill of stonecutting, and ultimately returned to Madison in 1911 to found Di Rienzo Monuments with his brother, Joseph. Originally named Lake View Monumental Co. (and later renamed Di Rienzo Bros. Inc.), brothers Vincent and John eventually joined the business at its leased property at the corner of Regent Street and Highland Avenue, where it still exists today. One can easily imagine the view of Lake Mendota that would have been visible from this corner, before the trees and houses filled in the landscape.

The business continued to grow and prosper over the years and, after about five years, the property was purchased. When the City of Madison decided it needed to build a high school on the West Side, the City Council tried to implement condemnation proceedings against the property. But the Di Rienzo brothers held firm and the city finally gave up the effort, although it did try again 20 years later, failing a second time.

John Di Rienzo married Sarah Anderson and they had three sons, two of whom—Roland and Francis followed in their father's footsteps in the mid-1940s, eventually taking over the flourishing monument business and running it until 1986. Roland passed away in 2015 and was laid to rest at Middleton Junction Cemetery with his wife, Melinda, and son, Perry. Francis—who passed away in 2017 at the age of 90—had most recently stopped by the business in 2013. He was thrilled to see the improvements to the property, and delighted to see the business still here at the corner of Regent and Highland, carrying on a tradition of service which had spanned several generations.

After Roland and Francis retired, the store changed hands several times and is now part of the regional Sunburst family of monument stores, headquartered


in St. Cloud, Minnesota. Stop by the store at the corner of Regent and Highland for a tour of local history. You will see the steel beams that once held hoists moving tons of granite slabs, as well as the original sandblasting room, where a set of goggles still hangs from a hook on the wall.



Dane County Board Report — District 10

I hope this edition of the RNA Newsletter finds you and your family well. The Board of Supervisors is just beginning a new term. Following our recent election, women now hold 17 of 37 Dane County Board seats or 45.9%. That is the highest percentage in over a quarter century.



in 2002, before rebounding over the past several years. For some historic perspective in 1970, only 6% of board members were women. Statewide, women held 18 percent of the seats on county boards coming into the 2018 election cycle, according to the Wisconsin Counties Association. Only Eau Claire County, with 14 of 29 (48.2%) of supervisors being women, rivals Dane County on that measure.


As for me, a new term has come with a new committee assignment. I have been appointed this term to the Environment, Agriculture and Natural Resources (EANR) Committee, the appointment also has me serving on the Land Conservation Committee (LCC). The EANR Committee is the legislative committee that oversees Dane County's Land & Water



Resources Department (LWRD), which ensures the protection and enhancement of Dane County's natural, cultural, and historic resources; provides the County's citizens with a broad array of accessible, high quality resource-based recreational services and facilities; and supports citizens, communities, local governments and other agencies and organizations in their resource management and protection activities. LWRD consists of five divisions: Administration, Land Conservation, Office of Lakes and Watersheds, Parks, and Water Resource Engineering. Additionally, my work on the LCC will approve county policy on land and water conservation issues and oversee county land conservation division staff in the appropriation of grant and conservation dollars.

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

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
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
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One City Early Learning Opens Charter Doors in Fall of 2018

Do you believe all children in our community, regardless of income level, deserve to have the same opportunity to receive a high quality early childhood education as their more affluent peers often do?

One City Schools in South Madison with its "two generation approach," is ensuring that all children enter school "reading ready" and that families have the support, knowledge and skills they need to help their children achieve longterm success.



One City currently serves 51 children, ages one to five. UW System recently chartered part of the school as a "Senior Preschool," enabling One City to provide tuition-free, student-centered, projectbased education to as many as 82 children in 4and 5-year-old kindergarten. As a new incubator of innovation in preschool to grade 12 education, UW System will offer the community and Madison public schools an opportunity to learn what works and incorporate these learnings into their school programming. One City Junior Preschool will

> continue to provide a tuition-based education to children ages 1 to 3, as well as tuition scholarship assistance to families with economic need.

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New Outdoor Playscape at Wingra School

Sitting on the hill in the midst of Dudgeon Park, Wingra School, an independent K–8 progressive school, has spent two years working on a plan to design an outdoor playscape that reflects their commitment to outdoor play and environmental education. *Meet Me Outside* was born out of a desire to create a sustainable landscape that would spark the curiosity of students, neighbors, and friends.

The playscape will include natural landscapes for

climbing and exploring, a music area, boardwalk,

rain and pollinator gardens, a food forest, a council

ring, and a stage. In addition, the design includes a labyrinth for walking meditation and reflection. The space will be accessible, and school officials hope that it will become a focal point for school and neighborhood activities. Construction will coincide with Madison City Parks renovation of the back playground at Dudgeon Park.

Both projects are slated to get underway in June and are expected to be completed by August.








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Real Estate Corner


