Streets and Transportation News

As spring arrives and neighbors reemerge from their homes, the potential for negative interactions on neighborhood streets between automobiles and pedestrians and bicyclists

increases. As a reminder, there is an on-line Traffic Incident Report available at the bottom of the RNA website (regentneighborhood.org) to report concerns involving negative—or potentially negative—interactions between pedestrians and/or bicyclists and automobiles. These concerns might include accidents or close calls, speed violations, and infrastructure issues. The results are being entered into a database and mapped to support improved safety in the neighborhood. This survey is meant to supplement—not replace—concerns reported through more formal means including 911 calls, Alder communication, and use of on-line city of Madison reporting tools. The more this tool is used, the better data we will have to support safety improvements in our neighborhood. While accessing the tool you might also want to take a look at the latest version of the mapped data, available there as well.

The Streets and Transportation Committee has completed the development of a detailed transportation plan for the RNA. The plan provides a transportation policy vision for the neighborhood as well as an understanding of the issues of concern and the impacts of various possible solutions to those concerns. The RNA board is currently reviewing the plan, which is available on the RNA website. Please take a few minutes to read the plan and let the committee know if there are any aspects of the plan you disagree with or if there are other streets and transportation safety issues that we have not included. As a reminder, here are State of Wisconsin pedestrian laws:

- 1) At an intersection or crosswalk where traffic is not controlled by traffic control signals or by a traffic officer, the operator of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian, or to a person riding a bicycle or electric personal assistive mobility device in a manner which is consistent with the safe use of the crosswalk by pedestrians, who is crossing the highway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk.
- 2) No pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk, run, or ride into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is difficult for the operator of the vehicle to yield.
- 3) Whenever any vehicle is stopped at an intersection or crosswalk to permit a pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device to cross the roadway, the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.
- 4) When crossing at place other than crosswalk, every pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device crossing a roadway at any point other than within a marked or unmarked crosswalk shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway.



- From a citywide perspective:
 - I worked on a resolution that clarified and strengthened our immigrant protection policies.
 On February 7, 2017, I was delighted to receive unanimous support of my colleagues after we listened to the most emotional and impactful testimony in my years as alder.
 - The Midtown Police Station planning and construction continues on schedule.
 - As one of 5 alders appointed to the Police & Community Relations Subcommittee of the Common Council Organizational Committee, we were charged with providing a forum for

residents and members of the Council to discuss police and community goals, priorities, and interactions; building a deeper understanding of policing for elected officials and members of the public; exploring models and options from other communities related to policing and other police policies; providing a forum for information sharing regarding police training, policies, data, and trends including detailed presentations from the MPD related to policing; and, making recommendations to the Council on short-term policy, procedure, and training while waiting for the results of the Ad Hoc Review of Police Policies and Procedures. Our subcommittee recommendations will be presented to the full council in May. 

The advent of sports bars and coffee shops may have changed the tavern culture forever, but people are still on the lookout for places to interact outside their own living rooms. If you're one of them, you've probably already started spending time at the Regent Market Co-Op doing more than shopping: sampling the latest keg with the staff or a friend, treating your kids (or yourself!) to an ice cream cone, having a pint while commenting over your shoulder to whoever's listening to your reaction to today's headlines. If not, give it a try sometime. A "grocery" store may not be the first place that comes to mind when you feel like "going out", but maybe ours should be. 



News from Franklin Elementary School


Greetings from Franklin! We have been very busy over the past quarter learning and growing at an exponential rate (no joke!). Students who came in as pre-readers have surpassed end-of-grade-level expectations. Kiddos who had a difficult time sharing toys are now collaborating on group projects integrating technology!

We are just wrapping up our spring conferences. I was able to attend many of them and at times had to hold back tears of pride at just how much had been accomplished so far this year. Some teachers at Franklin call fourth quarter the "Quarter of Excellence" for students to try their best and work hard. As a staff, we talked recently about not focusing on the summer or next year just yet, but on finishing the year strong. We are poised to do just that. Recently we had a professional development day and half our day was spent reflecting on the year so far and then focusing on the one or two high-leveraged strategies that will move the needle on student achievement.

We had a Paint the Playground event on April 22nd. Many Franklin community members came out to spruce up our existing space with paint, plants, and other beautification projects. Efforts are underway for a long-term plan to update the Franklin playground. Stay tuned for more information!

We have a Franklin Flash Dash coming up on May 19th. This is a fun run for students at Franklin. All K–2nd grade students will participate and collect pledges for the laps they run. The money we raise will support our playground fundraising and also a new space at Franklin coming in the fall of 2017—The Wonder Workshop.

On June 9th, construction will begin at Franklin School. We will be getting two elevators and our office will be moved to the first floor and will include a welcome center and secure entry. The construction will be going throughout the summer. We are also

excited to bring a maker space to Franklin called The Wonder Workshop. This will be a space where students, teachers, and families can tinker, create, collaborate, and construct. We are partnering with the Madison Public Library through a Making Spaces project with Google Ed and the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh. Dane County Board Report — District 10

In March, the Board heard a presentation from Hunden Strategic Partners on their firm's 276-page draft market study, moving forward on a comprehensive master plan for the Alliant Energy Center (AEC) campus. They suggest renovating the Coliseum, adding two new hotels, expanding the existing Exhibition Hall, building connecting skyways and

creating more dining opportunities.

The community will now have a chance to add their input and help develop a more detailed Master Plan that would address both the current uses of AEC facilities but also explore potential future uses that could involve both the public and private sectors. Additional planning would include identification of key target industries such as agriculture and food Systems; health tech, life sciences and advanced manufacturing, in addition to tourism.

In April, the Board unanimously approved a \$2.3 million contract to develop our long-sought day center for homeless people, which will transform the former Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce building at 615 E. Washington Ave. into a resource center for homeless people in the county.

After renovations, the building will offer laundry facilities, showers, storage space, a kitchenette, a computer room and day rooms. Private offices will also allow homeless people to receive services such as health care and addiction treatment.

Additionally, the Board approved a \$1 million land contribution for a permanent supportive housing facility at 7933 Tree Lane. The County contribution will be part of the \$11.7 million project from Heartland Development of Chicago, which calls

for 19 two-bedroom units, 23 three-bedroom units and 22 four-bedroom units. Residents will also be offered a full range of support services at the site. This is the second time the County has worked with Heartland who also led the Rethke Terrace project off East Washington Avenue, which offers 60 studio apartments to Madison citizens who have been homeless or who are at risk of being homeless with supportive on-site services. The city of Madison is also contributing \$1.6 million for the Tree Lane project, which is slated for a groundbreaking this spring and could be ready for occupancy by April 2018. All land use approvals in addition to federal low-income tax credits have been secured.



ELLIOT HOUSE, 137 N. Prospect Avenue (1910)

This house was commissioned in 1910 by Edward C. Elliot, a U.W. professor of education. As their architect, Elliot and his wife chose Chicago architect George Maher, a leader in the Prairie School movement. They lived in the house until 1916 when Elliot became the chancellor of the University of Montana. In 1922, he became the president of Purdue University.

The building is on the National Registry of Historic Places, and was designated a local landmark on July 15, 1974.

The Architect

George Washington Maher (1864-1926) began his architectural career in Chicago as an apprentice at age 13. Later he became a draftsman in the office of famous Chicago architect J. L. Silsbee. Frank Lloyd Wright and George Grant Elmslie were draftsmen in that office, also. Maher went into private practice in 1888, at age 23, by which time he had established his own views on architecture. Massiveness, centralization and substantiality were the key things that should be reflecting in a building, he thought. He said, also, that a building should have a psychological function, an idea that was original with him. He tried throughout his career to bring these elements to fruition in his designs, to develop an American architecture, but was never completely successful. Even so, Maher had a big influence on architecture in the Midwest.

His influence on the Midwest was profound and prolonged and, in its time, was certainly as great as was Frank Lloyd Wright's. Compared with the conventional architecture of the day, his work showed considerable freedom and originality, and his interiors were notable for their open and flowing space.

The Elliot House was commissioned during the third period in Maher's career, when he was being influenced by modern European design. For example, the curved pediment above the front entrance to the house is a European design that became a signature of Maher's during this period. One also can see the symmetrical, blocky massiveness from Maher's earlier manifesto, and the Prairie School influence in the wide overhanging eaves and the belt courses on the second floor that emphasize the horizontal.

Many buildings have been copied from Maher's designs, including the house at 2021 Van Hise by Chicago architects Murphy and Cloves.

Monroe Street Farmers' Market Begins Third Season



Spring has arrived and summer is nearly upon us, which means it's farmer's market season! On Sunday May 7th, the Monroe Street Farmers' Market will open for its third season. Every Sunday morning, from May to October, more than 25 vendors will converge on the

parking lot in front of Edgewood High School, offering its patrons everything from fresh produce and pasture-raised meats, to freshly-baked pastries, and sizzling-hot tacos. The market's vendors have been busy for the last few months digging, planting, building, and laying the groundwork for a fantastic upcoming season.

The goal of the market, which was started in 2015 by a group of vendors and neighborhood residents, is to provide a venue where people can connect with their neighbors and buy their groceries direct from local producers. Each year, the market's organizers think about ways to creating a fun, family-friendly environment, by regularly featuring live music and free activities for kids. Now, heading into its third season, the market has cultivated a diverse mix of vendors offering a variety of products that can rival some of the larger markets in the area, but in a much more low-key setting.

This is a gem of our neighborhood — how amazing is it that many of us can walk or take an easy bike ride/drive to a market that provides pretty much

everything we need to eat for a week? Not only that, it's also a perfect venue to catch up with neighbors and form lasting relationships with the people that provide us with the good food we want to eat. We want this market to stick around for years into the future, and one way to help that happen is to make it part of your regular weekend outings.

For the 2017 season, organizers expect the Monroe Street Farmers' Market to continue to grow as word gets out to new customers, and new, unique vendors are added to the mix. 


Rain Garden Initiative

A rain garden is specially designed to collect rain water and clean it before it reaches the lake. When rain water washes through streets, parking lots, and over roofs it collects all kinds of dirt and chemicals. If that water goes directly into the storm drain, then it ends up right in the lake — along with all that grime. A rain garden filters the water so that by the time it reaches the lake it's fresh and clean. What's not to love — fresh flowers and fresh water!

At Friends of Lake Wingra, our goal is to install 1,000 rain gardens in neighborhoods where storm drains lead to Lake Wingra. We know that clean water is key to maintaining the health of all the plants and animals that live in the area. Not to mention, to keeping the lake a place that is pleasant for boating, fishing, and swimming.






