

# Oliver's to Open on Old University in Fall 2014

Proprietor Bob Harriman recently met with Regent neighbors to announce his new restaurant, describe the restaurant and answer questions.

The Regent Neighborhood gains a new restaurant this fall in the recently-developed space at 2540 University Avenue in the Mullins Development. In environment and dining options, Oliver's promises a middle ground between its neighbors Lombardino's and the Blue Moon Bar & Grill. Owners Don Michelson and Bob Harriman promise food we would serve at our homes every day without constraints on time. In other words, everyday food that is anything but ordinary. Oliver's will serve brunch every weekend in addition to offering lunch and dinner every day.

While Oliver's is the first brainchild of collaborative owner's Don Michelson and Bob Harriman, its local roots are strong and conceived in restaurant know-how. Both Don and Bob are "old west side" kids: two West High grads who went on to attend UW-Madison. Don has found success in commercial real estate, while Bob owns a general contracting firm that has built many Madison dining favorites (including last year's Heritage Tavern, Francesca's al Lago, and Sardine—of which he is a co-owner). "Oliver's is the culmination of 35 years of around or in the [restaurant] business," Harriman said. While choosing to remain a designer and builder of restaurants until now, Harriman is excited to try on this new role, saying, "I've always wanted to do thisthis is what I've always wanted to try."

Plans are for Oliver's to seat 93 people at the bar and dining area and will open additional outdoor seating as Wisconsin weather allows. Co-owners Bob and Don aspire to create a welcome destination for nearby neighborhood residents as well as employees of the UW Hospital. Recognizing that there is a unique feel




University Heights is one of Madison's first suburbs and an area that has been named to the National Historic Register for its diverse collection of architecturally-important homes. Since its inception in 1893, its curvilinear streets and beautiful hilltop vistas have made it a highly-desirable area for homeowners. Homes include some of the oldest in the district, as well as modern construction that echoes vintage architectural details. As you stroll through this notable neighborhood, you are invited to visit seven exceptional gardens. Sites encompass shady woodlands as well as sunny vegetable and floral displays. Plantings range from ancient Camp Randall oaks to the newest perennial cultivars. Garden structures include stone walls, paths, and patios; fountains and ponds; and an authentic Japanese teahouse. Talk with homeowners, landscape designers, Olbrich volunteers, and Master Gardener volunteers, and learn some of the techniques employed by the artists and gardeners who pay homage to this historic community.




The garden of Ron Rosner and Ronnie Hess is one of seven in University Heights to be featured in this year's Tour.

Summer is definitely here! Here is a summary of some key neighborhood issues:


• Oliver's—our new restaurant at 2540 University

• The University Ave Corridor (UAC) Plan was approved by the City Council on May 6. It has truly been a long and arduous process. we discuss the changes to the ordinance.


















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## Dane County Board Report, District 10—Jeremy Levin

I hope this edition of the RNA Newsletter finds you and your family well. As I begin my service for another two-year term on the County Board, I was reappointed to the County's Health and Human Needs (HHN) committee and elected to serve as Chair. I value my role on HHN, as the county spends more than half of its budget on human services for residents in need.

The 2014-16 term will see an active term for the County's human services: HHN, along with the Executive Committee, was presented the findings of an audit report from Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP in regards to Dane County's Department of Human Services current approach to and future planning for Purchase of Service contracting on May 15. This analysis will hopefully lead us down a path to more efficient and effective contracting; The HHN committee has also worked to finally secure a daytime homeless resource center that should open up this fall, while the purchasing of that site and renovations move forward, homelessness will unfortunately be a continued concern that will face the committee and our community; The HHN Committee will continue the County's work on racial equity and be involved in the start of the study involving the County Jail, assessing our three current jail facilities for space, security, mental health, and supportive services for inmates.

In non-human service news, the county has established this new endowment fund to support Dane County Parks. The new fund, "The Friends of Dane County Parks Endowment," will be managed by the Madison Community Foundation and enable anyone with a passion for the parks to make a tax refundable donation of any asset, including cash, stock and real estate. The endowment has been created through a successful public/private partnership with Dane County and the Madison Community Foundation, which will match 2-to-1 all donations to the endowment in 2014. Individuals interested in making a gift to The Friends of Dane County Parks Endowment are encouraged to contact Darren Marsh, Dane County Parks Director, at marsh@countyofdane.comor at 608.224.3766.

Finally, Dane County's two composting sites, in Verona and Waunakee, will stay open until July 1<sup>st</sup> to provide free compost to the public. Dane County will be giving away compost by the car and truck load for free, after recently being notified that municipal partners like the City of Madison won't be bringing compost material to county sites any longer.



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## Greetings from Randall!

One June day, I made my way over to our partner school Franklin to visit the primary grade kids. A kindergartner asked me to tie his shoe. I told him to give it his best shot first, and then I'd put the finishing touches on the laces. It dawned on me that I don't receive requests for such assistance at Randall, especially during this season of bare feet and flip-flops.

The event reminded me of the words of Dorothy Canfield Fisher that I shared with our students during morning announcements around Mother's Day. "A mother is not a person to lean on, but a person to make leaning unnecessary." I suppose the quote could somehow be fashioned to fit an Independence Day theme as well. Our goal and greatest joy as parents and teachers is watching young folks grow to need us less and less and want us more and more.

This past year, Randall joined all Madison schools in broadening this "teach a man to fish" approach. You may have heard of what's called the gradual release of responsibility. The four-step process begins with the teacher demonstrating the task at hand ("I do"). The students then join the teacher in performing the act ("We do"). The collaborative element follows, with students engaging with one another ("You do together"). The final component is independent work (I do alone). That peer practice piece was the missing link back in many of our own elementary school days.

A former student of mine stopped to visit me not long ago with his first-born child in tow. He noted that he hears all the time from his cronies about how different kids are today as compared to when their parents were tadpoles. He asked me my take on that notion. I suggested he look at the changes in the world and realize that we are all products of our environment. My feet never knew shoes during my Louisiana summers. I was out the screen door at dawn and back home when the locusts legged a lullaby to the setting sun. Now an unchaperoned child signals a red alert to any bystanders, and understandably so. One has to wonder if play dates, video game escape and a schizoid schedule of organized activities aren't the result of a prominence of potential perpetrators.

As our children grow, we engage them in our own gradual release of responsibility. We show our children how to live wisely, safely and responsibly. We fashion and share such a lifestyle with them. We encourage them to build friendships that allow them to learn, play, dream and resolve conflicts with an ever diminishing dose of parent control. When they

do achieve independence, our wish is the same as it has always been - that they be safe and happy.

The increased interactions across fences and along the avenues that summer affords us reveals the safe haven that the Regent Neighborhood is to all of us. Keep your earbuds at bay so as to enjoy birds as bards, rolls of thunder, and harbinger bike bells. And if by chance a challenged cherub asks for your help in tying a shoe, start with step two: We do.

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
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## News From Regent Market Co-op





# A Note from the President —

In May, the Madison Common Council adopted the amended University Avenue Corridor Plan. Although city boards and commissions made some changes to the plan, the final version largely preserved the neighborhood's vision for the Corridor as expressed in the original plan.

The Plan vision statement reads: The Corridor is a livable, walkable community that is a pleasure to live and work in.

A vision of a more pleasurable place and a more visually appealing corridor took a major step forward on June 10 when the Madison Art Commission made a \$10,000 grant to support a proposed art project beautifying the Highland and Walnut bridges and underpasses.

In the Spring semester, as a class assignment, UW Professor Sam Dennis's Urban Design class explored those areas with neighborhood input. From that, they proposed a variety of ways that public art could transform those areas. Their designs can be seen on the RNA website. The City Planning staff is working with those designs to create a plan to radically transform the underpasses and bridges. There's still a lot of work to do and significant dollars to raise to move this to completion but this is an encouraging start.

We ask you to imagine the transformation of a dark and uninviting place to a place of color and light that offers an attractive, welcoming passage from the west Campus to the Regent Neighborhood. And we invite you to support this work.

The RNA will certainly be invited to financially support this and other work to beautify the corridor. Besides personal donations to the project, we trust you will make your annual RNA membership gift to support important investments like this in our neighborhood. You can mail your gift with the enclosed membership form or, as many do, bring it to the RNA July 4th Festival at the West High field.
